' NC 656 377 Ach' a' Chuil ' (1)

'The remains of Ach' a' Chuil, a depopulated settlement which was in existence in 1747, when it is shown to consist of about six buildings with arable(2). It was cleared in 1814-19.'

(3), (4)

'There are approximately sixteen building foundations, some with structural divisions, ranging in size from 7.0m by 3.0m to 30.0m by 4.0m; also upwards of half-a-dozen enclosures. Two corn-drying kilns were identified at NC 6562 3773 and NC 6574 3773. There is extensive run-rig and a few lazy-beds.' (OSPI: JM :16.3.1977)
