(ND 3761 6761) Broch (NR) (remains of)

The remains of a 2nd - 3rd century broch founded on pure sand among the sandhills of Freswick Bay and now practically obscured by sand and debris.

Excavated by Sir Francis Tress Barry between 1890 and 1900, it measures 32 ft 8 ins in diameter within a wall, 11 ft 6 ins thick, which has a scarcement and two mural cells. The wall is generally 7 ft high 'but is partly broken down on the side towards the land, where the original entrance probably was. Facing to NE is an entrance passage by the foot of the stair, of which fourteen steps still remain. It goes up to the left from the middle of the entrance passage. . . Two curved walls of secondary construction divide the interior area of the broch into segments. Finds include a cup-marked stone, which was in front of John Nicolson's house at Nybster (ND 3663) in 1910.

The R C A H M include a plan, presumably based on Sir Francis Tress Barry's excavation plan, but apparently inverted as compared with Anderson's description, so that the entrance with the stair is in the SW instead of the This plan also shows outbuildings attached to the W side of the broch.

The broch is now obscured by sand, debris and a later building attached to its N side, but survives in the form of several short stretches of internal and external walling, 0.3 m high on the N, E and S sides. Along the Ξ side of the outer wall, two short sections of walling which may belong to an outbuilding may be traced. Resurveyed at 1:2500.

The cup-marked stone is now part of an exhibition in the old schoolhouse at Nybster (ND 3682 6368).

The very obscure remains of the broch are generally as described by the previous authorities. The 'later building noted by the previous field investigator is the outbuilding illustrated by the R C A H M, whose plan is approximately 60° % of N incorrect in orientation. Recent back-filled excavation by Batey (b) has taken place (b.C.BATEY, DURHAM here. Published survey (1:2500) correct.




Fig. 6 .- Broch, Freswick Links (No. 34); Ground-plan.

34. Broch, Freswick Links.—Situated among the sand-hills about 1 m. N. of Freswick House, is a broch (fig. 6) the foundations of which

rest on the pure sand. It was excavated by the late Sir Francis Tress Barry, and described by Dr Joseph Anderson, but it is now in a very ruinous condition and its features largely obscured by sand and debris. On excavation the broch wall was found to be 11' 6" thick, with a scarcement 12" to 18" wide on the inside: it enclosed an interior area 32' 8" in diameter. The wall was for the greater part of its extent about 7' high, but was partly broken down on the W. side where the original entrance probably had been. Facing NE is still visible the entrance passage by the foot of the stair, 2' 9" wide, beside which there was a chamber. Fourteen steps of the stair remained, passing up to the left from the entrance passage as entered from the exterior, the steps growing narrower from 3' 10" in width at the bottom step to 2' 6" at the highest. At a distance of 17' round to the left from the inner end of the entrance passage was the opening to a chamber in the thickness of the wall, now ruinous. This entrance was 2' 3" in width, and 4' in height, and gave access to an oblong chamber 12' in length, 4' in width, and nearly 7' in height. Directly opposite the entrance in the interior is also the entrance, 2'9" wide, to a chamber not now measurable. Two curved walls of secondary construction roughly divided the interior area into segments.

There were found in this broch the cup-marked stone now at Nybster (No. 576 (1)), an oval vessel of sandstone with a rudely hollowed cavity measuring 6" by 4", and several quern stones.

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Freswick Sands Broch. - This broch is situated among the sand hills on the margin of Freswick Bay a little to the north of Freswick House. Like the Wester Broch, its foundations rest upon pure sand. The broch wall, which is 11 feet 6 inches thick, and has a scarcement from $12~\mathrm{to}~18$ inches thick inside, incloses an interior area of 32 feet 8 inches in diameter. The wall remains for the greater part of its extent about 7 feet high, but is partly broken down on the side toward the land, where the original entrance probably was. Facing to N.E. is an entrance passage by the foot of the stair, 2 feet 9 inches in width. There are remains of a chamber at the foot of the stair, of which fourteen steps still remain. It goes up to the left from the middle of the entrance passage, the lowest step being 3 feet 10 inches in width, and the steps gradually narrowing as they ascend till the uppermost is only 2 feet 6 inches in width. At a distance of 17 feet round the interior wall to the left of the inner opening of the entrance passage is the opening to a chamber in the thickness of the wall on the floor level of the area. This entrance is 2 feet 3 inches in width and 4 feet high, and leads into an oblong chamber 12 feet in length, 4 feet in width, and nearly 7 feet in height, and coved at the further end. Two curved walls of secondary construction roughly divide the interior area of the broch into segments.

The objects found in this broch were a boulder of sandstone with nine cup-marks on its surface, an oval vessel of sandstone with a rudely hollowed cavity 6"(152.0 mm) by 4"(101.6 mm), several broken stone vessels of similar character, and one or two quern stones.

From Freswick Sands Broch,-Two humeri of the Great Auk (now extinct); narrow piece of bone, notched on both sides at each end; pin of hone, 13 inches in length, with globular head; pin of bone, 15 inches in length; needle of bone, 31 inches in length, the eye imperfect; borer of bone, 4 inches in length; half of a whorl of bone; double-edged smalltooth comb of bone, $2\frac{3}{4}$ inches in length by $1\frac{5}{8}$ inches in width, composed of sections held together by an ornamented slip of bone passing along the centre of the comb on each side and clamped together by rivets of bronze; double-edged comb, 31 inches in length by 13 inches in width, ornamented with incised saltires; four portions of similar combs; two borers or pointed implements of bone, 64 and 23 inches in length; whorl of grey sandstone, 15 inches in diameter, decorated by eight small circular sinkings round the periphery, and also on both faces by an incised circle with four arcs impinging on its inner circumference, each enclosing a central dot; whorl of rough grey sandstone, 1g inches in diameter, having seven small circular sinkings on one face and six on the other; sinker of sandstone, 31 inches in length, with shallow groove round the middle; bent piece of thin, flat bronze with three rivet holes.

Brass pin, $2\frac{1}{12}$ inches in length; iron pin, with ornamented head; brass button, ornamented with a cross pattern; ink-bottle of clay, $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches in height by 1 inch by $\frac{7}{8}$ of an inch in breadth and width; two bronze needles, imperfect; bone needle, $5\frac{7}{8}$ inches in length, with flattened head; mine fragments of bronze and twenty-nine pins of brass from Freswick sands
