"Two fragments of symbol stones were found built into an old wall at Stittenham. Both are now in Inverness Museum. Both are portions of sandstone slabs." (1) "No further information was found during field investigation regarding these stones. Stittenham was formerly part of the Ardross Estate. Info. Mr Allison, Stittenham House." (OSFI: WDJ: 8.5.1963)

Stittenham Symbol Stone Fragment :- Two sandstone fragments, bearing incised representations of a deer and a wolf in Pictish style were found 'built into an old wall' at Stittenham before 1891. Often known as the Ardross 'wolf' and 'horse' they are preserved in Inverness Museum. (INVMG 00.208-9)
