It's what I thought initially too, but the local agri experts dissuaded me and then if you look at other side of what would be the upper wheel, there is no contact surface, just the thinnest lip. They think it's a shaft fitting and that the holes on the body are for other fittings. I like the idea of re-use. If the lower portion was also a rotary wheel it would be a really unusual type for here... have you seen high-sided ones on the West?
