

# Glenfeshie Estate Woodland Restoration Scheme Desk-based Assessment and Walkover Survey





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### **Summary**

This is a report of the results of a desk-based assessment and archaeological walkover survey of Glenfeshie Estate, south of Kincraig, in the Cairngorm Mountains. The work was conducted on behalf of Glenfeshie Estate Ltd prior to a five-year woodland restoration scheme. The location of twenty-six new sites was recorded, including one new shieling settlement, and additional structures were added to the records of some previously recorded settlements. All mapping, unless otherwise stated, is reproduced by permission of Landmark Information Group under RoCAS license LIG1044. The site plan has been kindly supplied by Glenfeshie Estate Ltd.


### 1.0 PROJECT BACKGROUND

A desk-based assessment of the historical and archaeological background and a rapid archaeological walkover survey of Glenfeshie Estate had been requested as part of a proposed five year woodland restoration scheme by Glenfeshie Estate Ltd. The requirement arose due to the situation of the scheme within an area of archaeological potential/sensitivity<sup>1</sup>. The work was carried out by Ross and Cromarty Archaeological Services, although extensive survey work between 1999 and 2003 by North of Scotland Archaeology Society (NOSAS) had already recorded twenty-seven settlements in Glen Feshie.

The intention of the desk-based assessment and walkover survey was to record the extent, location and significance of archaeological sites which may be impacted by the proposed woodland restoration and management scheme in order to provide recommendations for their safeguarding.

### 2.0 SITE LOCATION

Glenfeshie Estate is situated to the southwest of the Cairngorm Mountains, to the south of Kincraig (Figure 1).

Glen Feshie is a typical glaciated U-shaped valley through which the River Feshie flows from south to north. The flat valley floor rises to steep heathery hillsides on the west and the Cairngorm Mountains on the east; the river is braided in places due to flash flooding during the winter months<sup>3</sup>.




Figure 2: Location of the existing regeneration and planting areas<sup>13</sup>

The woodland restoration scheme will take place over five years and will cover a total area of 4,280 hectares; this will complement the existing mature semi-natural woodland of 671 hectares. In addition, there are 130 hectares of established natural woodland regeneration with a further 411 hectares where natural regeneration is being encouraged. The existing areas of woodland and proposed regeneration and planting areas are shown divided into five zones in **Figure 2**.

### 3.0 ARCHAEOLOGICAL AND HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The glen has been extensively surveyed by Meryl Marshall and North of Scotland Archaeology Society (NOSAS) and the reports of their findings have been published on the Highland Historic Environment Record<sup>4</sup> and in the publication :*Glen Feshie: The History and Archaeology of a Highland Glen*<sup>5</sup>. Prehistoric sites were not found during this survey<sup>6</sup>; however, absence of evidence of such activity does not mean that there will not be any such sites in the area. In addition to the NOSAS surveys, Glenfeshie Estate (or parts thereof) has also been surveyed as part of an Environmental Impact Assessment in 2000<sup>7</sup> and prior to cable undergrounding in 2010<sup>8</sup>.

Military Survey of Scotland (1747-1755) shows the upper end of Glen Feshie as being wooded along the banks of the river. Settlement begins to appear as the valley broadens out with small areas of cultivation on the river banks and becomes more intense as the River Feshie meets the River Spey

All that remains of these small 18<sup>th</sup>-19<sup>th</sup> century townships today are the low heather-covered structural footings scattered along the river terraces of the glen.

The archaeological survey from 1999-2003 charted the evolution of the glen from use for transhumance, to settlement, cultivation and sheep farming and finally a sporting estate<sup>10</sup>. As early as 1812 the forest of Glen Feshie was being advertised for sale as summer grazing for black cattle or shooting ground<sup>11</sup>. This placed a negative pressure on the land and contributed to the de-population of the valley<sup>12</sup>.

### 4.0 AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

The *Scottish Planning Policy 2010*<sup>14</sup> describes how archaeology should be managed when considering planning decisions and determining conditions for developments that have an impact on the historic environment. The scope and method of the impact assessment is guided by *PAN 58: Environmental Impact Assessment* (1999)<sup>15</sup> and the recommended mitigation is based on Forestry Commission Scotland guidance and complies with *Scottish Planning Policy*.

### 4.1 Overview

The aims of this study were to assess the significance of archaeology in Glen Feshie and the potential impacts on it in order to plan appropriate mitigation in response to the woodland planting and regeneration proposal.

The objectives of the assessment and survey were to:

- É Gather data for all known archaeological features within a defined study area
- É Rate the archaeological or cultural heritage significance of all of the identified features
- É Assess the likelihood of other previously unknown remains surviving unrecorded in the area
- É Assess the magnitude of impact and significance of effect of the proposed woodland planting and regeneration upon these
- É Suggest appropriate mitigation methods

### 4.2 Professional standards

Ross and Cromarty Archaeological Services conform to the standards of professional conduct outlined in the following:

- É Institute for Archaeologists' (IfA) Code of Conduct<sup>16</sup>
- É IfA Code of Approved Practice for the Regulation of Contractual Arrangements in Field Archaeology<sup>17</sup>
- É IfA Standards and Guidance for Desk-based Assessments and Field Evaluations 18

### 5.0 METHODOLOGY

The assessment comprised desk-based research and archaeological walkover surveys. Sites and monuments considered to be of archaeological interest have each been assigned a site number unique to this report.

The Site Gazetteer in Appendix 1 lists these in numerical order, along with data detailing their location and status, and a description of the nature and scale of the site. Each site number is also designated on GIS shapefiles.

### 5.1 Desk-based Assessment

A desk-based assessment has been conducted in order to assess the archaeological potential of the area based on previously recorded sites and any historical documentation.

The drawings of the area, as supplied by the client, were checked in detail against the Ordnance Survey 1:25000 Map, the Highland Council Historic Environment Record (HHER), the National Monuments Record of Scotland (NMRS), the Highland Council Archives and Historic Scotland records of scheduled monuments and listed buildings. Online aerial photographs were checked and the map collections of the National Library of Scotland were studied. Other literary sources were also consulted.

As far as possible a desk-based assessment was carried out for each discrete planting area in terms of the planting scheme supplied by Glenfeshie Estate.

### 5.2 Walkover survey




Figure 3 Location of survey area

A rapid walkover survey of the planting areas (**Figure 2**) was undertaken on 8, 23, 24, 28-31 March and 8 April 2011. Additional tracts of Forestry land were covered during the survey, as per the request of Scottish Woodlands Ltd for the purpose of management planning. The extra areas included four tracts to north of the Year 2 planting scheme and two tracts to southwest of the Year 3 planting scheme. The outline of the entire area assessed is shown in the location map in Figure 3.

The aim of this walkover survey was to identify and record any previously unrecorded archaeological remains within the survey area. Archaeological sites were plotted using ArcPad GIS software on a handheld Windows Mobile-based computer with GPS capable of sub-metre accuracy. Previously known archaeological sites were also plotted, though not surveyed in detail, on GIS software in order to provide a reference point for locating the sites on to the main GIS shapefiles / database.

### 6.0 **RESULTS**

Each site identified during desk-based research and the walkover survey has been compiled into one Site Gazetteer (Appendix 1) for the purpose of providing a complete table of archaeological sites within the areas of the woodland management scheme. The sites not designated with HHER numbers have not been previously recorded on the HHER.

### 6.1 **DESK-BASED ASSESSMENT**

Unlike many parts of the Highlands, Glenfeshie has been the subject of extensive and detailed field survey which has provided records for the location, type and extent of Post Medieval settlement and WWII encampments in Glen Feshie<sup>19</sup>. Meryl Marshall has compiled years of desk-based research and survey information into her publication Glen Feshie: The History and Archaeology of a Highland Glen $^{20}$ .

Post Medieval settlement dominates the glen, from permanent settlement ruins along the River Feshie to extensive summer -shielingøsettlements in more upland areas along smaller burn valleys. By the early-mid 19th century, the primary use of the glen was as a private shooting estate<sup>21</sup>. This is reflected in the remains of associated buildings and the alignments of shooting butts across higher ground in the glen.

During 1942-1946, the World War II era, areas within the glen were requisitioned for military training by the Highland Fieldcraft Training Centre and Canadian Forestry Corps<sup>22</sup>. The remnants of their bases and training areas are still visible. Otherwise, Glen Feshie continued to be used as a sporting estate. One of the changes occurring in and around the area during modern times is the woodland plantation and clearance that have occurred associated with the timber industry. The landscape is thus now largely open mountain and moor broken by forestry plantations and areas of natural Scots Pine.

There are no Scheduled Ancient Monuments or Listed Buildings located on Glenfeshie Estate and it is not a designed landscape.

### 6.1.1 Historical cartography

Roy's Map of Scotland 1745-1763

Roy shows settlement and cultivation along the banks of the River Feshie ó Touloa, Drumnacallech, Achloanbeg, Achloanmor, Stranlia, Achnahoid, Rinisabruach and Stronavaity. Tomfad sits beside the Aldmor.

John Thomson's Atlas of Scotland 1832

Thomson shows scattered settlement along the River Feshie.

First Edition Six-Inch Ordnance Survey Map 1872

Again, various settlements and buildings are shown on the 1<sup>st</sup> edition maps. These are highlighted in the Highland Historic Environment Records and in Marshall's report.

J.G. Bartholomew's Survey Atlas of Scotland 1912

Bartholomew shows Tolvah, Druimcaillich, Achlean, Stonetoper, Carnachuin, Ruigh-aiteachain and Ruigh-fionntaig along the River Feshie.

## 6.1.2 Highland Historic Environment Record (HHER)

The glen has been thoroughly surveyed by Meryl Marshall and NOSAS and the reports of their findings of Post Medieval settlement in the glen have been published on the Highland Historic Environment Record (HHER). The HHER site numbers of relevant archaeological sites identified during the desk-based assessment are listed in the Site Gazetteer, Appendix 1. These comprise previously known sites from historical cartography/documentation and previous survey work.

### 6.2 WALKOVER SURVEY

As the whole assessment area had not been systematically surveyed, a rapid archaeological reconnaissance survey was undertaken. This consisted of a walkover survey of the yearly planting areas in search of any visible or upstanding archaeological remains that may have previously been undiscovered. All new sites are highlighted in bold in Appendix 1.

As per the recommendations of Highland Council Historic Environment Team (HET), the areas surveyed by NOSAS were neither re-surveyed nor re-recorded. However, when possible, previously known archaeological sites were visited in order to gather polyline and point data to create a full and accurate GIS database for the assessment. These sites will not be discussed in this report, as more detailed information is available in Meryl Marshall's publications. However, each structure has been described in the Site Gazetteer, Appendix 1.

### 6.2.1 Weather and ground conditions

Weather conditions were good for the majority of the survey, although heavy snowfall did result in postponement of the work during March. Clear skies contributed to high and extensive visibility on many of the days and on these days higher ground was covered. During the overcast and windy days, lower ground under forestry was surveyed.

The ground conditions in Glen Feshie are variable and this added constraints for the survey work. The terrain varied from the flat lower river terraces to steep-sided hills. Areas of an extremely steep gradient were not surveyed. Heavily ploughed and mounded areas were found under most forested tracts. In other areas, heather was ubiquitous and often extremely dense; juniper also created a dense ground cover in some areas. Areas which were densely covered with vegetation were difficult to access and forested areas that had been ploughed and mounded were challenging due to the disturbed nature of the ground. This could have resulted in archaeological sites being unnoticeable during this survey and previous archaeological surveys of the area.

### 6.2.2 Survey results

The location of twenty-six new sites was recorded, including one new shieling settlement. Additional structures were added to the records of some previously recorded settlements. The location of two

more new shieling settlements, Site 50 and 51, were also noted outside of the survey area. They have not been surveyed but are listed in the Site Gazetteer for future reference.

### a) Previously recorded Post Medieval settlement sites




Figure 4 Ruigh Fionntaig settlement (Site 11)

Most of the new sites recorded during the survey pertain to Post Medieval settlement and many of them are related to previously surveyed settlements. This is the case at Ruigh Fionntaig (**Site 11**), where new sites **Site 11o**, **Site 11p**, **Site 11s** and **Site 11t** are a turf enclosure and three further subrectangular drystone houses or house-byres associated with the rest of the settlement at Ruigh Fionntaig (**Figure 4**).

A fourth site, a ruinous track (Site 13) located to the west of the settlement at the base of the hill was also recorded at Ruigh Fionntaig.




Figure 5 Stronavaity settlement as recorded during the present survey (left) and previous survey (right)<sup>23</sup>

At *Stronavaity* (**Site 34**), the surveyors' interpretation of the structures differed to that shown in the previous record (**Figure 5**).

At *Allt na Caollaig* (Site 40), four extra sites were recorded: a drystone boundary wall (Site 40a), a drystone enclosure (Site 40b) and two pits (Site 40e and Site 40f).

The description of these settlements has already been recorded in detail and the extra sites serve to enhance the known extent of the remains, adding to the extensive work done by Marshall and NOSAS.

### b) Site 35: Shieling settlement at Allt Coire nam Mart




Figure 6 Site 35: Allt Coire nam Mart shieling settlement

Twenty-two new shieling structures were surveyed and recorded along the Allt Coire nam Mart (**Figure 6**), south of the Allt Mor and Coire Fhearnasdail. These structures comprise ruinous heather- and grass-covered stone and turf structures of varying shapes and sizes along the east and west sides of the burn (**Plate 2**). The two northernmost structures had been much mutilated by previous machinery operations, although the other sites appear to have remained undisturbed. Differences in condition and construction of the shielings may indicate that there have been multiple phases of building and use of this site. Further description of individual structures is recorded in Appendix 1.

There are no previously known historical records of this settlement, but it is worth noting that they are situated within relatively close proximity to Site 50 and Site 51 (two new shieling settlements located outside of the western survey area (**Plate 2**). Although the surveyors were the first to officially survey Site 35 and to record the location of Site 50 and 51, the Glenfeshie Estate gamekeepers were able to identify their locations prior to the archaeological recording of them.

### c) Other shielings

Two additional, much degraded shieling structures were also recorded at **Site 38** along the south end of Coire Fhearnasdail and another possible shieling, **Site 7**, was recorded on the east side of the Allt Mor. They appeared to have been mostly washed out by river flooding and hillslope erosion.

### d) Site 49: possible still

A rough, much degraded circular structure of drystone (**Plate 3**) was recorded alongside Allt Fhearnagan and has been interpreted as a possible still. It was located well upland to the east of settlement remains along River Feshie. The remote and hidden location of the site would support this theory.

### e) Camalup: Sites 42, 43, 44

Historical mapping had documented an unroofed structure at the north end of the survey area. The ruins of a byre (Site 42) were recorded during the surveying of a forested tract located to the west of it. Another forested tract to the northeast of the site revealed a possible clearance cairn (Site 43) and a revetted platform with walling (Site 44), possibly the remains of a road. The surveyor noted that the stones from the clearance cairn were similar in type, size and shape to those at the ruinous byre. It could be that the stone was dumped clearance material from the ruined building.

### f) Site 47

A prominent upright stone measuring 0.55m high and 0.60m wide at the base was recorded in a ride within a forested tract of land. It may be a grave marker or landscape marker (**Plate 4**).

### g) WWII and Shooting estate structures

Marshall had surveyed numerous structures associated with war-time training encampments. The recent survey recorded **Site 2**, a possible ÷pillboxøor guard cell (**Plate 6**), located to the south of Druimcallich settlement. A further two structures (**Site 39**), interpreted as possible trenches associated with wartime training, were recorded on the west side of the glen near Coire Fhearnasdail.

The locations of several lines of shooting butts were recorded during the recent survey: **Site 4**, **Site 10**, **Site 36**, **Site 37**, and **Site 45**. **Site 8** was a possible single shooting butt along the Allt Mor. The structures, in varying states of preservation, comprised either turf and stone or drystone structures (**Plate 5**).

Site 23i, a shooting target built of iron was recorded amongst WWII remains at Coille an Torr.

These sites reflect past usage of the estate for shooting activities.

### h) Other sites

The remains of a small wood and stone bridge or road platform (Site 14) covering a channel was recorded on the west side of the river at Carnachuin. A small subcircular stone structure (Site 21) and a grass-covered platform 25m long (Site 22) were recorded on the east side of the river at Carnachuin.

Two summit marker cairns, Site 5 and Site 6, were also recorded during the survey

Details of each aforementioned site are recorded in Appendix 1, along with the previously known archaeological sites in the survey area.

### 7.0 CONCLUSIONS

There are more than 250 individual archaeological sites within the survey area. These structures are categorised into 55 sites, most of which comprise numerous sites within settlements. There has been no evidence of prehistoric occupation recorded.

The sites comprise the remains of Post Medieval and pre-Clearance communities scattered across Glenfeshie Estate, which attest to former communities subsisting on agriculture for their survival. Following the Highland clearances, the Estate has continued as a sporting estate and the remains of this can be seen amongst wartime encampments of the mid 1900s

### 8.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

### 8.1 Categorisation of sites

The sensitivity of a site is based on its archaeological value. Protective designations are generally assigned based upon consideration of factors such as age, rarity, condition, site context, architectural design and historical associations. The rating used in the current assessment is based on Forestry Commission Scotland& Heritage Module, as summarised in **Table 1**. Sites must also be considered within their landscape and not as isolated features and thus categorisation is flexible depending on local potential<sup>24</sup>.

Woodland regeneration and management can affect the preservation of archaeological sites directly by planting and regeneration operations and indirectly by self-setting of trees or isolation of an area from its surroundings. New planting of woodland and unmanaged natural regeneration will have a high impact on the archaeological features identified if mitigation measures are not put in place. For the management of this, buffer zones have been recommended based on the Forestry Commission of current guidelines.

### 8.2 Guidelines

The monuments identified during the desk-based assessment and field surveys have been classified in Appendix 1 based on their type and significance. There is an array of known archaeology located in the planting zones, the majority of which is Post Medieval settlement which should be protected easily by having sites identified on the ground and maintaining the recommended buffer zones around them.




Figure 7 Location of buffer zones around archaeological sites

Due to the density of sites within some areas of the survey and the necessity to retain relationships between some of the associated structures and features, buffer zones have been created around site groups (**Figure 7**). Some of these zones take in settlements including farmsteads and their associated ancillary buildings, shieling groups, and enclosures. Tree planting, tree regeneration and fencing should be excluded from these areas, while future maintenance should include the removal of any new trees setting in these zones. This should retain visibility between some of the more important sites and associated landscape features.

### Specific guidelines include:

- An archaeologist should assist, if needed, in marking out the archaeological sites prior to any operations
- At least a 10-metre buffer zone should be maintained around any individual buildings including farmsteads, byres and shielings, while any new tree growth within these buffer zones should be removed

- A buffer zone of at least 5 metres should be left to each side of shooting butts, boundary dykes and enclosure walls and any new trees setting within these zones should be removed
- Access tracks for vehicles and the erection of any new fence lines should also respect the recommendations set out above
