
The crofting township of Big Sand




Centred on NG 75284 79229

The township of Big Sand was established in 1845 as one of the Gairloch crofting townships created by John Mackenzie. The Gairloch Estate map shows that there was a sizeable settlement here before this, and rental records go back to 1792. There were also estate maps for Little Sand farm where the campsite is today,



and Little Sand crofts which were on the N side of the road but never established.




Like most townships Big Sand crofters relied on fishing to supplement any income from crofting, and slipways can still be seen along the shoreline as well as a fishing station.

Today no crops are grown and only a few livestock are grazed, but a ruined corn drying kiln is a reminder of when crops were grown.



The Gairloch Estate Map of 1845 shows a sizeable cluster of buildings already in the area.




Some of these can still be seen





The township was made up of crofts 1 to 34 and 40 to 43.




The dwellings of the pre 1844 township were concentrated on the south eastern area which was the most sheltered part of the township.

When the crofts were laid out in 1844 it was proposed to plant shelter belts of trees along the west and north boundaries but it is not clear if this was ever done. Three North Erradale crofts, numbers 1,3 and 4 had a share of the Big Sand common grazings.

In 1958 the Crofters Commission planned a reorganisation of the Big Sand crofts. It was proposed that some crofts would be joined to form larger holdings. At the time there were 33 holdings in the township. 14 crofts had resident tenants, 9 had non-resident tenants, 6 were vacant and 4 crofts had heirs who had to be confirmed as tenants. When a vote was held to propose the reorganisation the majority of the crofters were against the proposal so it did not proceed and the crofts remained as they were.


During Mitchell's time as owner a number of the Big Sand crofts were sold and many crofts were not worked resulting on an influx of new owner crofters.

Ruin situated on Croft 2, Big Sand, Gairloch. NG 75419 78975 elevation 18m. Surveyed 04/02/2012



This ruin has been partially demolished and will soon be totally removed. It is constructed of local sandstone boulders with some chosen and dressed stone around the doorway. There is some evidence of layering and snecking between the larger stones. Lime mortar can still be seen amongst the stones. Latterly it was used as a barn, but due to its watertight construction it may have previously been a house, although there is a croft house on this croft. It is not possible to see any windows due to the demolition. The building is shown as roofed on both the 1st and 2nd O.S. The walls are 0.6m thick. Behind the ruin there is a ditch and beyond that a retaining wall built into the bank. In the SW corner of the building a large stone has been placed in the wall (see photo). To the SW of the ruin lies a platform measuring 9x8m which is remembered as a stackyard/garden. At its S. boundary lies a boulder wall measuring 8.10m with a thickness of 0.5m. Amongst the boulders there is some concrete showing some later addition to the building.

This croft house is first shown on the 2nd OS map. It faces S and is situated on croft 3 on a gently sloping area of ground. The site is fairly well drained but has a drain with retaining wall to the rear to take water away from the building.

It is traditionally constructed with chosen and dressed local sandstone that has been layered with snecking between the larger stones.

It has the traditional design of two windows and a door to the front, and a single window to the rear ,the direction of the prevailing wind.


The barn/byre to the W has been attached at a later date.

The walls and gable ends of the building have been raised when the building was reroofed. This can be seen quite clearly in both the stonework and mortar.

There are two fireplaces with substantial lintel stones.

The exterior of the building has been covered with a rough thin harling.

The building is about to undergo extensive renovation.



Steep slope

This ruin is situated along the ridge between two steep slopes. It is shown as roofed on the 1st OS but remains now as low footings up to a height of 0.5m.

The footings are constructed with boulders and a few chosen stones. The purpose of the building is unknown, although is it known locally as 'Larach Taigh Seumas' or the ruins of James house. It is not the typical construction style of the area.






This ruin is shown as roofed on the 1stOS map. There are only footings comprising boulders remaining. A track leading from the main passage lead to the ruin. There is no evidence of an entrance except for the byre drain leading to a midden.

On the 1st OS a well is shown as situated to the W of the building, today there is only a wet hollow.





This kiln is set into a bank of the stream that runs NE to SW through the township. The slope to the W of the kiln has been artificially graded.

The kiln is of solid construction, made with boulders and chosen stone that is layered, to a remaining height of 1.76m.

The bowl is 2m in diameter, and walls range in width from 0.6 to 1.0m. There is an attached kiln barn and visible

lintel over entrance to flue.

It is shown as roofed on the 1st OS, but in living memory was only used as a rubbish dump.


